PRAYER OF THE DAY

Let us pray.

A brief silence is kept before the prayer.

God of heaven and earth, before the foundation of the universe and the beginning of time you are the triune God: Author of creation, eternal Word of salvation, lifegiving Spirit of wisdom. Guide us to all truth by your Spirit, that we may proclaim all that Christ has revealed and rejoice in the glory he shares with us. Glory and praise to you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Then the readings for this Sunday may be read, as follows:

FIRST READING: Isaiah 6:1-8

A reading from Isaiah.

¹In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of the Lord's robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above the Lord; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts;

the whole earth is full of the glory of the LORD."

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the Sovereign, the LORD of hosts!"

⁶Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷The seraph touched my mouth with it and said:

"Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." ⁸Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

SECOND READING: Romans 8:12-17

A reading from Romans.

¹²Brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—¹³for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with Christ so that we may also be glorified with Christ.

GOSPEL: John 3:1-17

The Holy Gospel according to John, the 3rd chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jewish people. ²He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' ³Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the dominion of God without being born from above." ⁴Nicodemus said to Jesus, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the dominion of God without being born of water and Spirit. ⁶What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. ⁷Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' ⁸The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." ⁹Nicodemus said to Jesus, "How can these things be?" ¹⁰Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

¹¹"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things?

¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son-of-Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son-of-Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

¹⁶"For God loved the world in this way, that God gave the Son, the only begotten one, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

The Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Having read these readings, think of this:

Both in reading these passages of Scripture today and, when it is possible, in gathering for eucharist, we find ourselves standing before God, the Thrice-Holy One. In both places we should cry out with Isaiah, "Woe is me! I am a person of unclean lips, dwelling among people of unclean lips, and I cannot stand before God and live!" But the Holy Trinity gathers us into mercy: the Spirit gives us birth in baptism and forms us to pray; Jesus Christ is sent to share our death and our life, making us joint heirs of hope; the Father, the one who sends Jesus, loves the world and sends us with him as witnesses. There are not three gods, but one loving, rich, enfolding mystery. The Trinity is the living God we know, whose divine life we are drawn to share. With the word of these scriptures — as also with the bread and cup of the eucharist when that is possible — the coal has touched our lips and we can turn with good news and love toward our neighbors.

That all people shun the use of violence; and that, in remembrance of all the soldiers and civilians who have died in warfare, humankind maintain peace between nations, on our streets, and in our homes:

A brief silence.

O God, judge, peacemaker, and shield, for peace we pray:

Holy God, we praise your name.

That the pandemic end; that vaccines be fairly distributed; that the suffering be comforted; that those who are ill be made whole; and that you visit those we here name: Joana Plerpa, Jeanne Broyhill, Effie Stallsmith, Maggie Mount, Lee Hanson, Malcolm Stark, Norm Olsen, Barb Jensen, Charlotte Boeck, Lynn Kiewel, John Beston, Phillip Swingler, Maria Liwski, Tucker Dean, Luci Martino and family, Jane and the Sinks family, Robin, and the family of Dennis Wright. *A brief silence*.

O God, healer, mother, and nurse, for the sick we pray: **Holy God, we praise your name.**

That summertime offer refreshment to everyone; that relatives and friends find joy with one another; that travelers be kept safe; and that refugees receive refuge: *A brief silence*.

O God, friend, companion, and homeland, for summertime we pray:

Holy God, we praise your name.

That each of us rest securely in divine love; and that our private prayers be heard: *A longer period of silence*.

O God, wisdom, lover, and treasure, for ourselves we pray:

Holy God, we praise your name.

In remembrance of all who have died in the faith, we join with Mary to sing a magnificat of praise. That with all the saints, at the end of all things, we receive your eternal life;

Holy God, we praise your name.

Into your endless love we commend all for whom we pray, trusting as did Jesus in your grace and might, now and forever.
