As I write this our national elections are less than three weeks away. I hope that I am not growing numb to the rancor and incivility in our civic life that was unimaginable just a few years ago. We in the church seek to avoid making specific political statements. We honor the separation of church and state and the deal struck by the Founders that religious organizations will be tax exempt and free from government interference, and . . . that religious organizations will not make political recommendations and back candidates.

We are to pray for justice and seek to build the beloved community, that is the vision of the gospel, but we recognize that people will disagree on how we bring that justice and community about.

Yet, the church can lead and inform our civic life together. The Founders also expected that the electorate would be informed by both current events and their faith values and vote accordingly.

A recent article ran in "The Lutheran." It featured two Washington state senators, both active members of the ELCA, one a democrat and the other a republican, and how their attitudes of civility and working together was informed by their faith. The ELCA has also been offering opportunities to comment and read a draft statement that will be voted on at ELCA National Assembly next summer on a Christian view of our civic life together. You will recognize a familiar verse in the quote below.

The proposed statement anchors its arguments in the virtue of humility, citing Micah 6:8 ("What does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?") but cautioning readers that "while we are called to do justice and love kindness ... it is not always clear what that means in any particular situation" (page 17). With that in mind, it observes, walking humbly with God "must include welcoming and acknowledging the ideas, values, and contributions of all people, regardless of their religious tradition or worldview" (page 18).

The church – that's us, you and me – can lead the way in a more just and civil civic life.

Reconciling in Christ

RELC's Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Core Team is sponsoring important and informative forums. On October 20th and 27th, Gordon Lathrop leads discussions on "Principles of Biblical Interpretation" and "Applying Biblical Interpretation to Difficult Passages," respectively.

November 3rd and 10th: Gail Ramshaw will continue the discussions on the Bible, sex, and gender, that were started by Gordon Lathrop on October 20 and 27. On November 3 she will outline the diversity of biblical passages on two different but related topics: those that deal with male and female sexuality and those that touch upon gender, that is, societal ideals and roles that embody masculinity and femininity. On November 10, Gail will outline the current wide diversity of Christian teachings and practices concerning sex and gender, and she will indicate where the ELCA fits into the complex picture of 21st century Christianity.
