From the Pastor's Pen

I have heard many say that Thanksgiving is their favorite holiday. Oh, Christmas, Easter, all fabulous, but the stress and expectations aren't there for Thanksgiving. And everyone seems able to celebrate Thanksgiving. Although we do recognize that for many Native American communities, colonization has led to mixed emotions about Thanksgiving. Some First Nation groups observe a National Day of Mourning instead.

For Christians, the role of faith adds deeper significance.

Gratitude isn't just a polite custom, it's a biblical mandate. Scripture overflows with commands and reminders to give thanks. Psalm 107:1

(NRSV) declares, "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever." Biblical gratitude is rooted not in fleeting moments or a national holiday but in the eternal goodness and faithfulness of God. "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Col 3:17) Gratitude should permeate every aspect of our lives — at church, home, work and throughout the community.

One of the most challenging aspects of biblical gratitude is God's command to give thanks in *all* circumstances (1 Thess 5:18). This doesn't mean we're excited about pain, suffering or hardship, but we can maintain a thankful heart while trusting in God's goodness.

It's one thing to thank God for a promotion at work. It's quite another to offer thanks for a pink slip. Giving thanks to God for troubling medical news is tough. The key? Gratitude isn't merely a feeling. When the going gets tough, our theology — what we believe about God — shines through. Think about Job, who lost everything yet still blessed the name of the Lord (Job 1:21). Job's gratitude wasn't tied to material blessings but to his understanding of God's promises and presence. Paul, writing from prison, encouraged believers to rejoice in the Lord *always* (Philippians 4:4). This verse emphasizes that a grateful heart transcends circumstances, anchored in faith and God's goodness.



Midweek Advent Devotions

Midweek devotions for the Advent season are on December 4, 11 and 18. The theme for the Advent Devotional is "Words for the Beginning." This will coordinate with our special Advent Devotional Booklets from *Sanctified Art*. Let me share the words of Rev. Sarah Speed, one of the creative folks at *Sanctified Art* to introduce our theme.

"When I was a kid, my dad came up with "four things," four truths that he wanted my brother and I to memorize. Those "four things" were four reminders about love, responsibility, our choices, and God's care for us. Anytime I left the house as a teenager, my dad would simply hold up the number four to remind us: four things! We knew what he meant. We knew it was love. Friends, I think Advent offers that same invitation. Tucked into the end of the year when it can often feel like we've run out of time, Advent invites us to begin again. In the depths of winter, and on the heels of an election season in the United States, Advent declares: this is not the end, this is yet another beginning. With that hope and encouragement in mind, we have selected simple truths that we believe a mother would want to tell her baby, that God wants to tell the world, and that we need to tell each other. My prayer is that these weekly themes can be a foundation for beginning again, a foundation built on hope and love, as we once again begin again. May it be so, with God's help."



Create a Quilt Square

The creators of *Sanctified Art* also felt these words were "like a warm blanket bringing comfort." Sundays during fellowship time quilt patterns will be provided that relate to our theme. Materials will be available for you to be a bit creative. Our RELC quilters, the *Piecemakers*, have agreed to be on hand to help. Many creative options are available. Some may want to color the patterns. Others may want to cut and glue materials to the pattern. Some may want to use the pattern to create a real quilt square! You may take materials home to finish your creation and bring it back to display at church.

The *Piecemakers* will incorporate any completed square into a congregational quilt that we will display and send off with to Lutheran World Relief.

Bruce Onobrakpeya: The Mask and the Cross

Nigerian sculptor and printmaker Bruce Onobrakpeya began creating works depicting Christian iconography in 1966, when Catholic priests petitioned the artist to interpret the Passion of Christ. The resulting body of work is titled *Fourteen Stations of the Cross. Bruce Onobrakpeya: The Mask and the Cross* showcases the earliest of these commissions, from the late 1960s, on display through January 21 at the Smithsonian National Museum of African Art, 950 Independence Ave., SW, Washington, DC
